### From SOC's Policy for Use of Cellphones

During school hours cell phones are banned in all classrooms, the gymnasium and auditorium. Under specific teacher direction/permission a cell phone may be used to enhance classroom instruction. Please make sure your friends and parents know the times that you are in class. Phone calls are not permitted.

In an emergency the school office can be reached by telephone at 905 546 1500 or by email at office@mysoc.ca. Cell phones and other electronic devices cannot be used to download movies, games, television shows.

Headphones and earphones are banned in classrooms and hallways. They may be used in the cafeteria or gym.

Schools, academic studies, teachers and parents worldwide have all identified the risks of distraction and interruptions to learning caused by cellphones, whether via social media apps or phone calls. This has been flagged internationally, and more and more school systems are taking positive action to protect young people and ensure that they are able to fully focus on learning.

Accordingly, cell phones are banned in SOC's classrooms and must be on silent **and** in the student's bag. Students using cell phones in class will have their phones collected by the principal and returned at the appropriate time.
